ABOUT GLORIA PERKINS ... Interviewed by Emily Efferson

Gloria Perkins, an oil painter, grew up in Fairburn, Georgia, a suburb of Atlanta where she has lived and worked her entire life. She developed a passion for color and then painting as a child which led to her painting professionally in her early 20's while also pursuing a corporate career. She started teaching while still balancing her corporate career, but the more she taught, the more she wanted to teach and paint. Finally, she left her corporate job to pursue art full-time. Here is what she shared with AGL via online interview:



When and how often do you paint?

My husband and I travel a lot, so I make a point to pencil in "paint' days in my studio on my calendar and I prefer having at least 3 days without interruptions. I typically have 3-4 paintings going at a time to keep me from overworking a painting. Each painting has its own table, so I don't have to put anything away.

What about your life experiences helped you realize art was your passion?

When I would get home from work, eat a bite, and paint until 11:00pm. You always make time for what you have a passion for. Being a painter makes me happy. The challenges and decision making are exhilarating, especially when I see them translated onto the canvas. If you ask the question "what is art to me?" My answer would be "something I can't get enough of." Painting is a wonderful, unending journey and I am very thankful that I can pursue this journey.

Do you get painters block and what do you do about it?

When I get "stuck" with a painting, I move to another one. It's very important to work on 2 to 4 paintings at a time to keep from "overworking" a painting. That is when you lose your values!

Are you self-taught or did you study at an institution?

I have invested a lot of time and money to study with artists whom I admired, and with ones who shared their knowledge with me. After corporate retirement, I followed Robert Johnson. We have become very good friends over the years and I definitely consider him to be one of my mentors. After studying in France with



Huihan Lui, I returned to Giverny to paint, entered a plein air contest, and won the Claude Monet Award! As a result of this award I was given a lifetime opportunity to take groups of artists to Monet's Garden to paint after the Garden closed (and all tourists were gone).

What do you hope others see or "get" in your art?

I want to exude an energy that will set my paintings apart and make them distinctly mine. Whenever I am at the easel, I always get excited about working with the colors to develop a painting from the beauty I see. You know it is a good painting when the viewer wants to keep looking at it! Nothing is more



rewarding than to finish a painting and know it is good! As soon as I finish one, I start thinking about the excitement of another! Equally important is when I teach a workshop and have helped a student develop their skills to become a better painter.

Why do you choose subjects you choose? Has this ever changed for you? My favorite things to paint are Florals and my husband Jim actually grows my Hydrangeas, Peonies, and Roses! When we traveled to China, we went to a "dirt" market and bought 10 wonderful Urns and Vases and shipped them home and not one was broken! My studio is filled with items we have collected.

What are your most proud of?

Winning the Claude Monet Award in Giverny, France was a moment in time I will always remember. When my name was called it was an "aha" moment. Secondly, was when I was asked to do an Art Show of my paintings at the Amsterdam Whitney Art Gallery in New York.

What advice would you give to beginning artist?

In my classes, I advise my students to keep their excitement at a high level, noting this enthusiasm will be reflected in their paintings. Just remember, you didn't learn your ABC's in a day! Keep a level of patience and if you learn just one thing in a workshop your skills will continue to grow. Always continue the path of learning and sharing.

Unfortunately we had to cancel Gloria's workshop, scheduled for May, due to COVID19. We are working to get a reschedule date. So, continue to monitor the AGL website and member emails for new dates.




