



Meet Cheryl Caro ... by Jennifer Cutrer

Cheryl Caro became a member of the Guild in 2017 and first exhibited that year in the Summer Judged Show. Her colored pencil entry, *Kindred Spirit*, won first place. She then went on to be accepted into the River Road Show that same year and was awarded 3rd Place for *Living The Big Easy*. Since then, Cheryl has continued to hone her skills and has become a well respected and recognized artist in the colored pencil world. She has also won awards for her acrylic work. Here is Cheryl's story in her own words:






My art was put to the side for many years until in 2016 when I wanted to do portraits of my basset hounds. I wanted a clean, easy, portable medium and something I didn't have to spend too much money on buying all the supplies, so I bought a tablet and a tin of colored pencils. So today I choose colored pencil as my medium of choice. It is so very portable, clean, and very challenging layering one color on top of another color to create another color. Recently, I have painted a few acrylic paintings because the artist in me is always wanting to come out in another medium, so I picked up pen and ink and began doodling around with Zentangle.



One thing colored pencil has taught me, is to slow down and take my time. In my youth I would paint an oil painting in hours. Today I take days painting my acrylic paintings. I actually use the same process to paint my acrylic paintings as my colored pencil drawings with a layering technique.

Asked if I am a self-taught artist the answer would be a yes and no. Yes, I taught myself how to draw as a child but no when it comes to learning how to sharpen my skills as a colored pencil artist. Although I knew the basic core of colored pencils, I have learned so much more by taking numerous workshops with other talented colored pencil artist.

As a child my love of drawing animals resulted in me and my husband spending many hours at the New Orleans Zoo taking photos of all kinds of animals so I could paint them. Afterall, it was my dogs that got me back into my art, but today I am drawn to people and their natural expressions. I have definitely become a people watcher. I love the challenge of drawing people and capturing that one moment in time.



I am not a full-time artist nor is it my occupation. However, when I joined The Colored Pencil Society of America, I told myself that I was going to take on colored pencil with all my worth and try to be the best I could be. I hope to one day win an award in their yearly art show. So, I try and work at least 2 hours a day on my drawings. I normally make time at night while watching and listening to TV. I never really get painter's block because I am always looking for and watching people. The world is full of interesting people.

As for my advice to new artists: "don't let anyone tell you what you do is not considered fine art or that your art is worthless. And join social media art groups for support, advice, and encouragement." Asked what

I would like others to see or get out of my work. Nothing deep. All I hope is that I get them to smile or perhaps to think as to what my subject is looking at or thinking about. Most of all, I hope they enjoy my work as much as I enjoy drawing them.

Picture Day and Sunday Open Studio Resume in 2022

A brand new year with new hopes and new plans is just around the corner. AGL is planning to resume Sunday afternoon open studio sessions from 1:00–4:00pm. We thank those Guild members who want to paint on Sunday afternoons and have volunteered to open the studio on a rotating basis.

Also, we will resume our regular Picture Day schedule, which is the 3rd Sunday of each month during open studio hours from 1:00–4:00pm. The maximum number of paintings per artist still is at three (3). There is to be no artwork behind glass photographed and works on paper must be attached to some sort of support/mat to ensure that it does not buckle while being photographed.

Sometimes workshop schedules, receptions or holidays may be in conflict with Picture Day. When this happens Picture Day will be rescheduled either a week earlier or later. You can keep up with the latest Guild schedules on the website Calendar at www.artguildlouisiana.org/calendar.

Did You Know?

The Guild Studio in the Park is available as a rental workshop space to both private artists and art organizations. There are several rental options available. There is a special workshop model available to AGL members called the 80/20 contract. Instead of paying the flat per day rental fee, the member instructor receives 80% of the total registration fees received and the Guild receives 20% of the total. The Guild manages registration and promotion of the workshop, prepares an invoice and cuts a check to the member instructor for their appropriate share. In fact several member artists have recently held 1-2 day workshops using this type of agreement and donated their 80% to the Guild. "Donating" a workshop is a great way to support the organization and give back to AGL.

AGL Board meetings are open to all members. We encourage you to attend and see what the Board is working on for the organization. We invite members to bring ideas to share with the Board. However, if you want to present an idea to the Board you should notify the Guild in advance so that we can include you on the agenda for you. You can do that via the website www.artguildlouisiana.org and click on the "Contact" tab. Board meetings are generally scheduled for the 3rd Thursday every other month at the Studio in the Park from 11:00a.m. to 1:00p.m. Those months currently are January, March, May, July, September and November.

AGL Members Donate Hand Painted Pumpkins to Family Road Project

In early October the Board sent an email to members, requesting volunteers to paint pumpkins to donate to the Family Road Pak n' Play project. Family Road is a non-profit that gives the decorated pumpkins to donors of a certain dollar amount that will go the toward purchase of cribs that will be distributed to families who can't afford to provide safe sleeping accommodations for newborns.

Several members of the Guild got together over 3 weeks during open studio hours, painted pumpkins for the project. The Guild donated a total of 14 painted/decorated pumpkins to Family Road. 

Larry Downs - Color Your Life (Beginning Acrylics)

Larry's class will get you into using acrylics from the beginning in four 3-hour sessions – a lovely way to start 2022.

Larry takes you step by step through the tools and concept and application of basic acrylic painting. Learn and practice the various ways that acrylic can be used like watercolor, oils or abstract acrylic. He will also cover geometric shapes, values and use of additives to create textures. You will learn first by observing Larry doing demonstrations and then by hands on practice. Participants will end up with at least one completed painting.

Drawing provides shape for a good painting. A good drawing is a map, a plan, the cornerstone for a strong composition. In this class, you can hone your drawing skills regardless of your current skill level. Larry is a local artist/instructor who has conducted workshops at LSU in the Lagniappe program. He will cover the hows and whys of drawing, first through demonstrations, followed by hands on exercises and personal guidance. You will work from still life set ups arranged by Larry using direct lighting.
