Getting to Know Claire Pasqua ...

Claire's tenure as the AGL Vice President will begin January 1, 2026 and extend to December 31, 2027. This is what she shared with us about her path to being an artist.

"My first venture into creating art was painting on the lanai of my aunt's home in the suburbs of New Orleans. While playing with the children's watercolors on a canvas, I recall the quiet feeling inside that I realize now was a spiritual and emotional escape. I was 5 years old.

During my 6th grade year, I began taking art classes in a woman's home in Marro, LA. Her home was very loud and busy with children arriving and departing at different times. Again, I was able to ignore the bedlam while retreating into the creative side of my brain. Here, I was exposed to drawing with charcoal, pastels, and oils. I recall winning an award at a local art show for a charcoal drawing of cocker spaniel. I was thrilled. The schools I attended did not have art programs, so I had no further instruction for many years.

Prior to retirement in 2015, I was an RN and nurse practitioner for 34 years in various healthcare fields. When not working, I was occupied with a husband and two active children. I did sporadically enroll in private art lessons during the years in the Baton Rouge area.

The late Teddi Ruiz was a mentor and friend for many years. During this time, I received awards from art shows such as the Acadian Art Show, the Jambalaya Festival, and the Shrimp and Petroleum Festival. I was a member of the Gonzales Art Guild for several years, which I really enjoyed. Since then, I have had entries accepted into the juried River Road Show in 2016 and 2022.

In addition, I have participated in art classes by well-known Louisiana artists such as Alan Flattman, Judi Betts, Frederick Guess, Larry Downs, Heather Harney, Nanci Charpentier, and Carol Hallock. The Art Guild has provided opportunities for me to receive instruction from national artists such as Bill Farnsworth and Kim Casebeer. In conclusion, I have participated in workshops with international artist, Guido Frick, in Opp, AL at the Opp Cultural Arts Center.



South Louisiana has had an important influence on my art. Growing up in New Orleans, I learned to experience life through all five senses. Yes, even smell. My bright and bold colors reflect my experiences there. Residing in the Baton Rouge area in my adult years with a husband who loves the outdoors, has offered me a life more connected to nature. At home, I am inspired by flowers, birds, insects, and my husband's garden. Whether I travel in the backwoods and bayous of Louisiana, around the USA or Europe, I am always on the lookout for interesting subjects to paint.





The subjects of my art are as varied as my focus during my nursing career. I enjoy painting flowers, birds, still lifes, and landscapes. In other words, anything but people. I have spent most of my art years painting in oils, but I have begun dabbling in acrylics. But I have tried pastels, collage, and gouache.

If I recall correctly I joined the AGL in 2017, but participation was sporadic. Since then I have become increasingly more involved in activities such as the setting up of the River Road Show and our garage sale fundraiser. I enjoy it all!!! I also support and participate in Open Studio. I love the camaraderie and the input of fellow artists. If I could, I would move in the Studio in the Park.



Even now, when I paint, I still escape into that quiet place within myself".

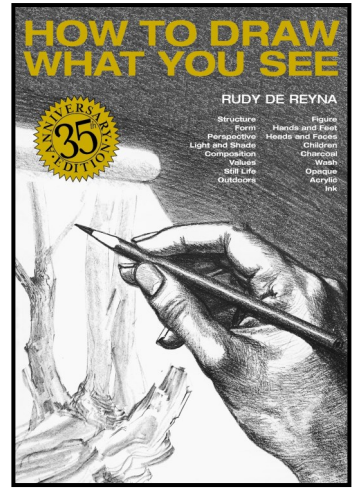

President's Pick: From the AGL Library: *How to Draw What You See*, by Rudy De Reyna

This month's President's Pick comes from what I would call the "back to basics but better than you remember" section of our library: *How to Draw What You See* by Rudy De Reyna. If you've never picked it up or if it's been awhile, this classic is worth rediscovering. In my journey, I find the more I draw, the better painter I become. Therefore, this was a welcome rediscovery.



De Reyna teaches you to look, *really* look, and then translate what you see using simple shapes, strong observation, and clear value relationships. His approach is direct, practical, and surprisingly confidence-building. Beginners get a roadmap for understanding form and light, and more experienced artists are reminded of the fundamentals that quietly power every great painting or drawing.

If you've been feeling stuck, rusty, or just want to sharpen your eye going into the new year, this is the perfect book to spend an afternoon with. It's a reminder that drawing well isn't magic; it's attention, patience, and practice. And De Reyna shows you exactly how to get there.

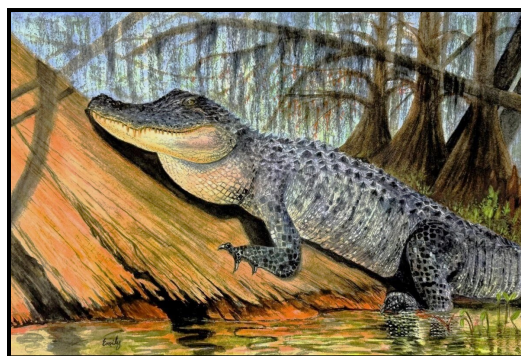

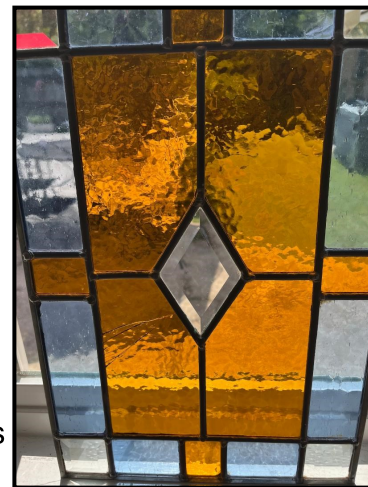
Kerry Curtin: Stained Glass – Create Your Own Treasure
